Cook, Michelle	<u>Our Children Can Soar</u>	A celebration of Rosa, Barack, and other African American pioneers of change
Demi	<u>Joan of Arc</u>	Provides an illustrated overview of the life of Joan of Arc, a French peasant girl who claimed divine guidance and led soldiers during the Hundred Years' War.
DePaola, Tomie	<u>For the Duration</u> (Read others in the 26 Farimount Ave. series)	The author relates his childhood memories of World War II, from gas rationing to air-raid drills, but tells how his friends from school, family, and doing things that he was good at carried him through.
Fritz, Jean	<u>Where Do You Think You're Going Christopher Columbus?</u> (Read other titles series)	Discusses the voyages of Christopher Columbus who determined to beat everyone in the race to the Indies
Graphic Library	<u>Levi Strauss</u> & other biographies	Graphic novel presenting the story of Levi Strauss and his invention of denim jeans.
Hill, Laban Carrick	<u>Dave the potter : artist, poet, slave</u>	Chronicles the life of Dave, a nineteenth-century slave who went on to become an influential poet, artist, and potter.

Krull, Kathleen	<u>A boy named FDR : how Franklin D. Roosevelt grew up to change America</u>	A biography of Franklin D. Roosevelt, discussing his childhood in one of the wealthiest families in the United States, his battle with polio, and his achievements as president.
Krull, Kathleen	<u>Jim Henson : the guy who played with puppets</u>	Chronicles the life of Jim Henson, describing how he pushed the boundaries of entertainment and brought the art of puppets to a new level with the creation of his Muppets.
Krull, Kathleen	<u>Kubla Khan : the emperor of everything</u>	An illustrated exploration of the life of the fifth Great Khan of the Mongol Empire Kublai Khan that discusses his building of Beijing, children, rule, and more.
McCarthy, Meghan	<u>Strong Man</u> (Read other titles by this author)	He could tear phone books in half, bend iron bars into giant Us, and pull a 145,000-pound train with his bare hands. But Charles Atlas wasn't always one of America's most famous strong men. Once upon a time, he was a "97-pound weakling" who was picked on by neighborhood bullies.
Nelson, S. D	<u>Black Elk's vision : a Lakota story</u>	Recounts how a childhood vision shaped the life of Black Elk, a Lakota-Oglala medicine man who was involved in the battles of Little Bighorn and Wounded Knee.
Pena, Matt de la	<u>A nation's hope : the story of boxing legend Joe Louis</u>	An illustrated introduction to the life and accomplishments of professional boxer Joe Louis
Scieszka, Jon	Knucklehead	A memoir of what it was like to grow up in the 1950s and other almost true stories by Jon Scieszka.

St. George, Judith	<u>Make your Mark, Franklin Roosevelt</u> (Read other titles by this author)	Examines the childhood of Franklin Roosevelt and the influences that shaped his life. Besides learning how to fit in with other boys of different backgrounds while attending boarding school, young Franklin was inspired by headmaster Peabody who set expectations for his students to help others and serve the world.
Van Allsburg, Chris	<u>Queen of the Falls</u>	Recounts the stunt performed by sixty-two-year-old retired charm school instructor Annie Edson Taylor, who went over Niagara Falls in a wooden barrel in an effort to gain fame and fortune.
Wallner, Alexandra	<u>J.R.R. Tolkien</u>	An illustrated description of the life of J.R.R. Tolkien, from his childhood in South Africa to his success as an author.
Weatherford, Carole Boston	<u>I, Matthew Henson</u>	Introduces readers to the life and accomplishments of explorer Matthew Henson who joined Robert Peary in planting the flag on the North Pole in 1909.
Yaccarino, Dan	<u>The fantastic undersea life of Jacques Cousteau</u>	A pictorial biography of Jacques Cousteau, covering his adventures aboard "Calypso" with his team of scientists, diving equipment, and waterproof cameras, and work to protect the oceans from pollution.

Cottrell Boyce, Frank	<u>Chitty Chitty Bang Bang flies again</u>	The Tooting family fits an old engine they find into their camper van, unaware that the engine once belonged to an extraordinary car and sends the family on an adventure across the world to rebuild the original Chitty.
Coville, Robert	<u>The Monster's Ring (series)</u>	Russell Crannaker's magic ring enables him to turn into a monster on Halloween and ward off the class bully once and for all.
DiCamillo, Kate	<u>The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane</u>	Edward Tulane, a china rabbit, was very pleased with himself, and for good reason: he was owned by a girl who treated him with care and adored him completely. Then, one day she lost him. He journeys to the depths of the ocean to the net of a fisherman, from the top of a garbage heap to the fireside of a hobo's camp, from the bedside of an ailing child to the bustling streets of Memphis. French, Jackie	<u>My Dad the Dragon (series)</u>	Horace receives an impossible homework assignment at King Arthur's School for Trainee Knights that requires him to kill a dragon; however, he is reluctant to do that because his father is one.

Greenburg, J.C.	<u>Andrew Lost with the Frogs</u> (series)	Still reduced to the size of insects, Andrew, Judy, and the robot, Thudd, go to a pond, where they encounter dragonflies, moss animals, and fierce larvae in an attempt to learn why frogs are disappearing throughout the world.
Gutman, Dan	<u>Satch and Me</u> (Series)	When 13-year-old Joe Stosh's coach brings a radar gun to practice, it prompts a discussion of who was the fastest pitcher in baseball history. Able to use baseball cards to go back in time, Stosh clocks the fastball of famous Negro League pitcher Satchel Paige.
Jenkins, Emily	<u>Toys Go Out</u> (Read others in this series)	Humor, affection and friendship take center stage in this delightful early chapter book featuring a little girl's three favorite toys. StingRay, Lumphy the buffalo and Plastic the bouncy ball embark on a series of adventures – including meditating on the scary unknown (washing machine) – and discover the importance of friendship, and overcoming differences and fears.
Levine, Gail Carson	<u>Fairy Dust and the Quest for the Egg</u> (Read other titles by this author)	Mother Dove, whose single blue egg holds the secret of the island's eternal youth, is thrown off her nest when Neverland is shaken by a terrible hurricane. The precious egg is shattered. Immediately, Neverland folk begin to age. Mother Dove chooses Prilla to be part of the fairy team to undertake the quest for the egg. Can one little no-talent fairy help save Neverland from certain doom?
Reiche, Dietlof	<u>I, Freddy</u> (Series)	Freddy, a remarkably intelligent golden hamster, learns how to read and how to write on a computer and escapes captivity to become an independent and civilized creature.

Rodda, Emily	<u>The Peskie Spell (Series)</u>	The magical world of the Realm has a terrible problem, a plague of mischievous, troublemaking Peskies. A wild west wind has brought the tiny creatures down from the hills in the thousands. They're making life in the Realm impossible, and eating up all the magic!
Scieszka, Jon	<u>Oh Say, I Can't See</u> (Other titles by this author)	Here is more historical mayhem with the Time Warp Trio. These time travelers must save American history, find a pet and avoid getting hung as spies.
Voigt, Cynthia	<u>Young Fredle</u>	Fredle, a young mouse cast out of his home, faces dangers and predators outside, makes some important discoveries and allies, and learns the meaning of freedom as he struggles to return home.

Hughes, Shirley	<u>Ella's Big Chance: A Jazz-Age Cinderella</u>	In this version of the Cinderella tale set in the 1920s, Ella has two men courting her, the handsome Duke of Arc and Buttons the delivery boy.

Levine, Gail Carson	<u>Fairy Dust and the Quest for the Egg (series)</u>	Follow fairy Prilla in her quest to save Never Land despite her feelings of inadequacy and frustration over being a "no-talent" fairy.
Osborne, Mary Pope	<u>Tall Tales</u>	A collection of tall tales about such American folk heroes as Sally Ann Thunder Ann Whirlwind, Pecos Bill, John Henry, and Paul Bunyan
Pinkney, Jerry	<u>Little Red Riding Hood</u>	On her way to see her grandmother, Little Red Riding Hood is tempted by a lurking wolf along the way. Only the activity of nearby woodcutters keeps the wolf at bay.
Storace, Patricia	<u>Sugar Cane</u>	In this retelling of the Rapunzel tale, a young Caribbean girl named Sugar Cane is taken from her parents by sorceress Madam Fate and forced to live in a tower overlooking the sea. Although her only company is a green monkey and the spirits of teachers, her love of music sees her through her difficult life.

Hatch Wyss, Thelma	<u>Bear Dancer: The Story of a Ute Girl</u>	Based upon the life of a real girl, this is the story of Elk Girl, a member of the Ute tribe who is captured by the Cheyenne during the 1860s, sold to an Arapaho warrior, rescued by a white soldier, and finally returned to her home.
Hopkinson, Deborah	<u>Billy and the Rebel: Based on a True Civil War Story</u>	During the Battle of Gettysburg in 1863, a mother and son shelter a young Confederate deserter.
Johnson, Angela	<u>A Sweet Smell of Roses</u>	Two young girls participate in a freedom march and listen to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. speak during the Civil Rights movement.
Krensky, Stephen	<u>Dangerous Crossing: The Revolutionary Voyage of John Quincy Adams</u>	Presents an illustrated, narrative account of the events in 1778, when ten-year-old Johnny Adams accompanies his father, John Adams, on a dangerous mid-winter voyage from Massachusetts to Paris in hopes of gaining support for the colonies during the American Revolution.

Levine, Ellen	<u>Henry's Freedom Box</u>	This is a fictionalized account of how in 1849 a Virginia slave, Henry "Box" Brown, escapes to freedom by shipping himself in a wooden crate from Richmond to Philadelphia.
MacLachlan, Patricia	<u>Sarah, Plain and Tall</u> (series)	When their father invites a mail-order bride to come live with them in their prairie home in Maine, Anna and Caleb are captivated by their new mother, but worried that she might not like being away from the sea.
McKissack, Patricia	<u>Abby Takes a Stand</u> (Read other titles in this series)	Gee recalls for her grandchildren what happened in 1960 in Nashville, Tennessee, when at the age of ten she passed out flyers while her cousin and other adults held sit-ins at restaurants and lunch counters to protest segregation.
Stroud, Betty	<u>The Patchwork Path: a Quilt Map to Freedom</u>	While her father leads her toward Canada and away from the plantation where they have been slaves, a young girl thinks of the quilt her mother used to teach her a code that will help guide them to freedom.
Whelan, Gloria	<u>Yuki and the One Thousand Carriers</u>	When Yuki's father is called upon to be a carrier in the Japanese royal procession from Kyoto to Edo, Yuki, her mother and their dog go along for the three-hundred mile journey. Yuki uses haiku to tell her story and present her feelings about the long voyage.

An author's note, glossary and index complete the book.
Davies, Nichola	<u>Extreme Animals: the toughest creatures on Earth</u>	Reveals how animals such as the polar bear, emperor penguins, roadrunners, camels, and reptiles adapt to and survive the most extreme conditions.
Denenberg, Barry	<u>Titanic sinks!</u>	Retells the events surrounding the sinking of the RMS "Titanic," describing the ship's construction and launch, and featuring authentic photographs and illustrations from the period.

McNulty, Faith	<u>If You Decide To Go To the Moon</u>	The reader participates in every aspect of a space journey, from packing to lift-off to traveling through space, ultimately landing at the Sea of Tranquility, the site of the first lunar landing in this engaging, informative book.

Barrows, Anne Ivy & Bean When seven-year-old Bean plays a mean trick on her sister, she finds unexpected support for her antics from Ivy, the new neighbor, who is less boring than Bean first suspected.

Bauer, Marion Dane A Bear Named Trouble (Read other titles by this author) Ten-year-old Jonathan is lonely, waiting for his mother and little sister to join him and his father, the new keeper at the Alaska Zoo in Anchorage, but no lonelier than the three-year-old brown bear whose mother abandoned him. They connect when the bear, wounded and hungry, runs blindly into town, visits Jonathan's back deck, and then tunnels into the zoo where he kills a goose, the boy's favorite. Basing her story on an actual incident, Bauer intertwines the two stories, emphasizing the bear's wildness.

Child, Lauren Clarice Bean Spells Trouble (Series) Clarice Bean seems to be in nonstop trouble these days, almost as much as Karl Wrenbury, who is the naughtiest boy at school. If only she could be more like her favorite book character, Ruby Redfort, girl detective, who is very good at getting out of trouble. The problem is, Mrs. Wilberton is planning a spelling bee, and just thinking about it gives Clarice a stomachache.
