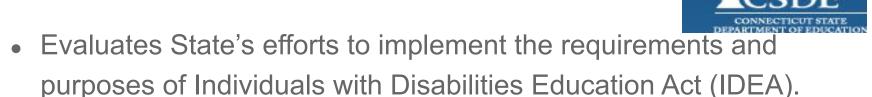

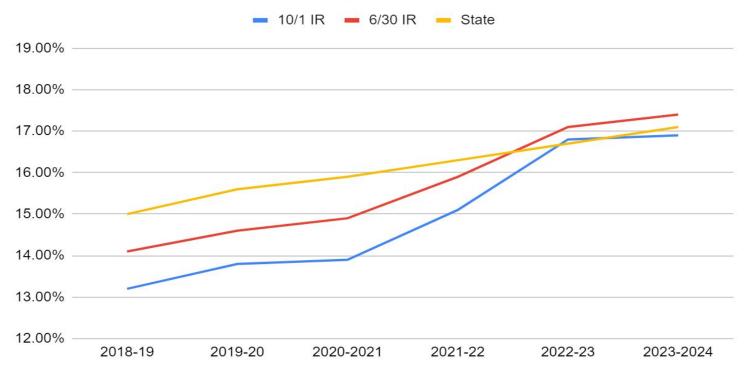

Excess Cost Reimbursement

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)
 Grant

Excess Cost Grant

- Per pupil expenditure x 4.5 is the threshold for excess cost reimbursement
- Simsbury's individual student 23-24 threshold = \$87,824
- Received 73.1% of expenditures over threshold in 22-23
- Operating Budget: Net of excess costs
- Estimated reimbursement\$2.4 million

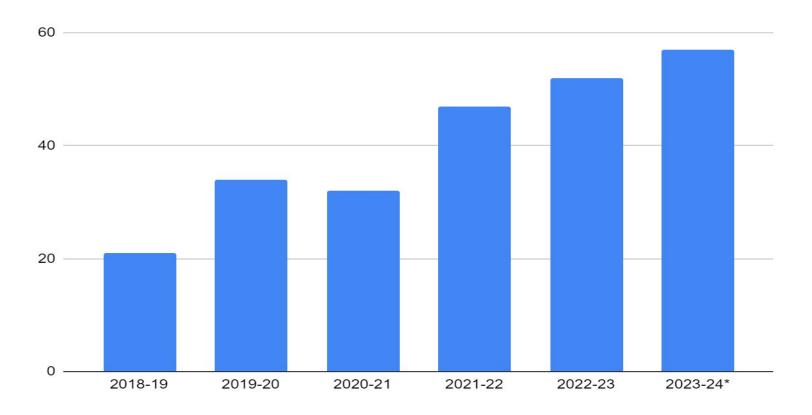
Middle School Reading Needs
