Bolden, Tonya	<a href="#">Searching for Sarah Rector</a>	Recounts the story of the 1914 disappearance of eleven-year-old Sarah Rector, an African American who was part of the Creek Indian people and whose land had made her wealthy, and what it reveals about race, money and American society.
Carlson, Laurie	<a href="#">Harry Houdini for Kids</a>	A biography of magician and escape artist Harry Houdini. Explains how Houdini performed some famous stunts and includes twenty-one magic tricks for readers to try for themselves.
Fleming, Candace	<a href="#">Amelia Lost</a>	This book traces the life of female aviator Amelia Earhart from her childhood to her final flight, discusses the extensive search for her and her missing plane, and includes photographs, maps, handwritten notes by Amelia, and sidebars.
Fleming, Candace	<a href="#">The Family Romanov: Murder, Rebellion, and the Fall of Imperial Russia</a>	Details the history of Russia's last royal family, the Romanovs.
Freedman, Russell	<a href="#">The Adventures of Marco Polo</a> (and other books by this author)	An illustrated chronicle of the travels of thirteenth-century explorer Marco Polo: includes a discussion of the controversy over whether he indeed went to China.
Kostyal, K. M.	<a href="#">Trial by Ice: A Photobiography of Sir Ernest Shackleton</a>	This book traces the adventurous life of the South Pole explorer whose ship, the Endurance, was frozen in ice and crushed, leaving the captain and crew to fight for survival.
Krull, Kathleen	<a href="#">Marie Curie</a> (and other titles by this author)	A biography of Polish-French physicist and chemist Marie Curie, who was a pioneer in the field of radioactivity and won a Noble prize in both physics and in chemistry.
Lee, Tonya	<a href="#">Almost Astronauts: 13 Women who Dared to Dream</a>	A look at the unsuccessful effort to get women into NASA's Mercury astronaut training program.

Macy, Sue	<u><a href="#">Bylines: A Photobiography of Nellie Bly</a></u> (National Geographic Biography series)	Discusses Nelly Bly's childhood, journalistic endeavors, 72-day adventure around the world, setbacks, marriage and opinions about civil rights issues of the period.
Montgomery, Sy	<u><a href="#">Temple Grandin: How the Girl Who Loved Cows Embraced Autism and Changed the World</a></u>	This book examines the life and accomplishments of Temple Grandin, an autistic woman whose love of cows led her to revolutionize the livestock industry.

Paver, Michelle	<u>Wolf Brother</u> Book One of the Chronicles of Ancient Darkness series	6,000 years ago, twelve-year-old Torak and his guide, a wolf cub, set out on a dangerous journey to fulfill an oath the boy made to his dying father - to travel to the Mountain of the World Spirit to destroy a demon possessed bear that threatens all the clans.
Riordan, Rick	<u>The Sword of Summer</u> The Magnus Chase series	Magnus Chase has always been a troubled kid. Since his mother's mysterious death, he's lived alone on the streets of Boston, surviving by his wits, keeping one step ahead of the police and the truant officers.

Scott, Michael	<u>The Alchemyst</u> the Secrets of the Immortal Nicholas Flamel series	Fifteen-year-old twins, Sophie and Josh, find themselves caught up in the deadly struggle between rival alchemists, Nicholas Flamel and John Dee, over the possession of an ancient book that holds the secret formulas for alchemy and everlasting life.
Selznick, Brian	<u>Wonderstruck</u>	Ben, loses his mother and his hearing in a short time frame and decides to leave his Minnesota home in 1977 to seek the father he has never known in New York City. A second story involves Rose, who lives with her father but feels compelled to search for what is missing in her life. Ben's story is told in words; Rose's in pictures.
Snyder, Zilpha Keatley	<u>The Bronze Pen</u>	With her father's failing health and the family's shaky finances, twelve-year-old Audrey's dreams of becoming a writer seem very impractical until she is given a peculiar bronze pen that appears to have unusual powers.
Ursu, Anne	<u>Breadcrumbs</u>	Hazel and Jack are best friends until an accident with a magical mirror and a run-in with a villainous queen find Hazel on her own, entering an enchanted wood in the hopes of saving Jack's life.

Craft, Jerry	<u>New Kid</u>	a timely, honest graphic novel about starting over at a new school where diversity is low and the struggle to fit in is real, from award-winning author-illustrator Jerry Craft.
Guibert, Emmanuel	<u>Sardine in Outer Space 4</u> (series)	Young space pirate Sardine foils the plans of Supermuscleman, a tyrant who wants all the galaxy's children to behave as she fights monsters under the bed, diseased tattoos and boredom.

Hergé	<u>Adventures of Tin Tin (series)</u>	This classic graphic novel follows the unquenchably curious young reporter Tin tin and his fiercely loyal dog Snowy as they discover a model ship carrying an explosive secret.
Kazu Kibuishi	<u>Amulet: Book One The Stonekeeper (series)</u>	After moving to their ancestral home, Emily and Navin's mother is kidnapped by a tentacled creature in the basement. This leads the children on a deadly chase into the magical world below their home.
Phelan, Matt	<u>Storm in the Barn</u>	In 1937, 11-year old Jack Clark faces many challenges on his family's Kansas farm, including bullies, a pesky younger sister and the effects of the Dust Bowl.
Telgemeier, Raina	<u>Smile</u>	The author relates, in graphic form, her experiences after she injured her two front teeth and had to have surgeries and wear embarrassing braces and headgear, all while also dealing with the trials and tribulations of middle school.
Watterson, Sam	<u>Calvin and Hobbes</u>	This book is a collection of comic strips following the adventures of Calvin and his stuffed tiger Hobbes.
Yeh, Phil	<u>Dinosaurs Across America</u>	A collection of comics that teaches interesting facts about each of the states, their history, people, and cities.

Avi	<u>Iron Thunder</u>	Tom gets work building the iron ship called the Monitor.
Axelrod, Amy	<u>Your Friend in Fashion, Abby Shapiro</u>	Beginning in 1959, Abby, nearly eleven, writes a series of letters to Jackie Kennedy, each with sketches of outfits she has designed, as she faces family problems, concerns about neighbors, and her own desperate desire for both her first bra and a Barbie doll.
Bradley, Kimberly Brubaker	<u>The War That Saved My Life</u>	A young disabled girl and her brother are evacuated from London to the English countryside during World War II, where they find life to be much sweeter away from their abusive mother.

Brandeis, Gayle	<u>My Life With the Lincolns</u>	In 1966 Illinois, twelve-year-old Wilhelmina is convinced that she, her parents and her sisters are Abraham Lincoln's family reincarnated. She is determined to keep them from suffering the same fates, and this becomes complicated when she and her father become involved in the Civil Rights Movement.
Curtis, Christopher Paul	<u>The Mighty Miss Malone</u>	Deza Malone, the smartest girl in her class in Gary, Indiana, accompanies her mother and older brother on a trip to find her father, an African American man who left to find work after the Great Depression hit.
Draper, Sharon M.	<u>Stella by Starlight</u>	A burning cross set by the Klan causes panic and fear in 1932 Bumblebee, North Carolina, and fifth-grader Stella must face prejudice and find the strength to demand change in her segregated town.
Howard, Ellen	<u>The Crimson Cap</u>	11-year-old Pierre Talon sets out in 1684 on the last ill-fated expedition of the great French explorer Rene-Robert Cavelier. The quest soon falls apart and Pierre finds himself captured by local Hasinai Indians. As he lives among them and learns more about their ways of life, he must decide whether to stay with them or risk everything to return home.
Lai, Thanhha	<u>Inside Out and Back Again</u>	Through a series of poems, a young girl chronicles the life-changing year of 1975, when she, her mother, and her brothers leave Vietnam and resettle in Alabama.
Levine, Kristin	<u>The Best Bad Luck I Ever Had</u>	Harry "Dit" Sims and his newest friend Emma Walker work together to come up with a plan that could save the town barber, an African-American, who is put on trial and faces a horrible end.
Lisle, Janet Taylor	<u>Black Duck</u>	Ruben Hart tells the story of how, in 1929 Newport, Rhode Island, his family and his best friend's family were caught up in the violent competition among groups trying to control the local rum-smuggling trade.

Morpurgo, Michael	<u>An Elephant in the Garden</u>	Lizzie and Karl's mother is working at a local zoo in Dresden, Germany, during World War II while their father is away fighting in France. She brings home a baby elephant that is slated to be destroyed as the Allied bombing grows closer. When they are forced to flee, Mutti feels they must take the elephant with them, adding even more danger to their journey.
Morpurgo, Michael	<u>Kaspar the Titanic Cat</u>	Fourteen-year-old Johnny Trott, a bell-boy at London's Savoy Hotel in 1912, becomes caregiver to Kaspar Kandinsky, the Prince of Cats, and soon the two are stowing away on the Titanic, where they are befriended by the Stanton family of New York.
Park, Linda Sue	<u>When My Name Was Keoko</u> (Read other books by this author)	In alternating chapters, ten-year-old Sun-Hee and her thirteen-year-old brother, Tae-yul, describe the changes their family undergoes starting in 1940, when the Japanese who rule Korea decree all Koreans must forsake their Korean names for Japanese ones.
Paterson, Katherine	<u>Bread and Roses, Too</u>	This tale is about two children caught up in the 1912 Bread and Roses Strike in Lawrence, Massachusetts. Jake labors in the textile mills, and Rosa goes to school while her mother and sister toil. Both Jake and Rosa are unwilling participants in the labor action.
Peck, Richard	<u>On the Wings of Heroes</u> (Read other books by this author)	Davy's small-town life reflects joy and sorrow just before and after World War II.
Philbrick, W.R.	<u>The Mostly True Adventures of Homer P. Figg</u>	Homer P. Figg escapes from his wretched foster home in Pine Swamp, Maine, and sets out to find his beloved older brother, Harold, who has been illegally sold into the Union Army.
Ryan, Pam Munoz	<u>Echo</u>	Lost and alone in a forbidden forest, Otto meets three mysterious sisters and suddenly finds himself entwined in a puzzling quest involving a prophecy, a promise, and a harmonica. Decades later, Friedrich in Germany, Mike in Pennsylvania, and Ivy in California each, in turn, become interwoven when the very same harmonica lands in their lives.
Senzai, N.H.	<u>Escape from Aleppo</u>	After Nadia is separated from her family while fleeing the civil war, she spends the next four days with a mysterious old man who helps her navigate the checkpoints and snipers of the rebel, ISIS, and Syrian armies that are littering Aleppo

		on her way to meeting her father at the Turkish border.
Slate, Joseph	<u>I Want to Be Free</u>	An escaped slave rescues a baby from slave traders.
Slayton, Fran Cannon	<u>When the Whistle Blows</u>	Jimmy Cannon is growing up in a railroad town in 1940s West Virginia and is determined to jump a steam train as it chugs its way through town. He knows it is dangerous and he is breaking rules, but the exhilaration is worth it. Besides, he's not like his dad, who is afraid to take a chance.
Tarshis, Lauren	<u>I Survived Hurricane Katrina, 2005</u>	Barry's family prepares to evacuate before Hurricane Katrina hits, but when his little sister gets very sick, they are forced to stay home and face the floodwater that sweeps Barry away.
Thor, Annika	<u>The Lily Pond</u>	Having left Nazi-occupied Vienna a year ago, thirteen-year-old Jewish refugee Stephe Steiner adapts to life in the cultured Swedish city of Gothenburg, where she attends school, falls in love, and worries about her parents who were not allowed to emigrate.
Williams-Garcia, Rita	<u>One Crazy Summer</u>	In the summer of 1968, after traveling from Brooklyn to Oakland, California, to spend a month with the mother they barely know, eleven-year-old Delphine and her two younger sisters arrive to a cold welcome.

Aronson, Marc	<u>Trapped: How the World Rescued 33 Miners from 2,000 feet Below the Chilean Desert</u>	A detailed account of rescue efforts to save thirty-three miners, who got trapped in a copper-gold mine in San Jose, Chile, examining the psychological, physical, and environmental factors influencing the course of the rescue, and describing the efforts of how experts from around the world came together in response to the crisis.
Bonner, Hannah	<u>When Bugs Were Big, Plants Were Strange, and Tetrapods Stalked the Earth: A Cartoon Prehistory of Life Before</u>	This book takes a tour of the earth three hundred and twenty million years ago, during the Paleozoic Era, and investigates the plants and animals found there.



Borden, Louise	<u>His name was Raoul Wallenberg: Courage, Rescue, and Mystery During World War II</u>	This book chronicles the life of Raoul Wallenberg, a Swede, who at the end of World War II was able to save thousands of Hungarian Jews from the Nazi concentration camps.
Cummins, Julie	<u>Women Daredevils: Thrills, Chills, and Frills</u>	Fourteen women who flouted convention to work as entertainers in the years between 1880 and 1929 are profiled in this book. They performed thrilling feats in the water, in the air, and in the circus.
Freedman, Russell	<u>Who Was First? Discovering the Americas</u>	Who really discovered America? This book examines the evidence that indicates others may have traveled to the Americas before Columbus in 1492 including Viking ruins, Mayan stonework, and other mysterious objects found in New England that date before Columbus.
Hopkinson, Deborah	<u>Titanic: Voices From the Disaster</u>	This book draws on stories from survivors and archival photographs to describe the history of the "Titanic" from its launch to its sinking.
Jenkins, Steve	<u>Down, Down, Down</u>	Caldecott Honor winning Steve Jenkins provides a top-to-bottom look at the ocean, from birds and waves to thermal vents and ooze. Half the earth's surface is covered by water more than a mile deep, but most of this watery world is a mystery to us. In fact, more people have stood on the surface of the moon than have visited the deepest spot in the ocean
Kops, Deborah	<u>The Great Molasses Flood: Boston, 1919</u>	January 15, 1919, started off as a normal day in Boston's North End. But all of a sudden a large tank of molasses exploded, sending shards of metal hundreds of feet away, collapsing buildings, and coating the harbor front community with a thick layer of sticky-sweet sludge. Many people died or were injured in the accident—the book reveals who was to blame.
Kurlansky, Mark	<u>The Story of Salt</u>	This handsome picture book explores every aspect of salt: The many ways it's gathered from the earth and sea; how ancient emperors used it to keep their subjects happy; why salt was key to the Age of Exploration; what salt meant to the American Revolution; and even how the search for salt eventually led to oil.
MacCaulay, David	<u>Built to Last</u>	This book has colorful, detailed illustrations and explanations of how castles, mosques, and cathedrals were built.

Mann, Elizabeth	<u>Statue of Liberty (series)</u>	Photographs and text trace the history of the Statue of Liberty, describing what the various symbols found on the statue mean, how it was built, what it means to the American people, and how it has been restored over the years.
Pringle, Laurence P.	<u>Billions of Years, Amazing Changes: The Story of Evolution</u>	A captivating view of evolution that brings together research from a variety of scientific disciplines to create a compelling argument that supports what is now called evolution by natural selection.
Rusch, Elizabeth	<u>Eruption!: Volcanoes and the Science of Saving Lives</u>	Follows volcanologists Andy Lockhart and John Pallister as they helicopter onto active volcanoes to install equipment, climb into blast zones to collect ash samples, and endure suspense as they wait to find out if their predictions are accurate.
Stone, Tanya Lee	<u>Almost Astronauts: 13 Women Who Dared to Dream</u>	Profiles thirteen women who challenged social norms and government policies to prove they could be exceptional astronauts.
Wecchsler, Doug	<u>Bizarre Bugs</u>	A visit to the fascinating world of some very unusual creatures, both in appearance and behavior. Most of the insects live in tropical habitats, but the text does relate similarities in behavior to those found in North America.
